FROM PRESIDENT & CEO CAITLIN DALY

What a year it has been at the SPCA Serving Erie County! I am so proud to tell you about what we have accomplished with your support, and to share a little about

where we are going in 2024. In 2023, we shifted to a more open, inviting, and support-centered model. In doing so, we made it easier for our community to participate in our many programs and to access the help they need through our Lipsey Veterinary Clinic, pet pantry, behavior support team, and beyond. We spearheaded rescue and shelter support groups, meeting several times a year to ensure we are working together to help animals in Erie County. We are committed to continuing our work for those most in need, while providing holistic and supportive programs that are accessible to all. In this newsletter, I am so excited to share with you how we have expanded our services and improved the SPCA experience for animals and humans alike.

Gus, a 70-pound, exuberant, mixed breed dog was going crazy sitting in an SPCA kennel all day. Being a bigger guy with a lot of energy, he stayed longer than average waiting for his people. Thanks to Doggie Entourage, a Doggie Day Out program that allows members of the public to take SPCA dogs out into the community for a break from shelter life, Gus was able to experience adventure and fun with some lovely Erie County residents! This program has allowed us to engage with our partners in new ways: from bringing dogs to businesses for a day of employee enrichment, to sharing all the wonderful parks available to Doggie Entourage participants. This program helps dogs, but it is also a wonderful opportunity for anyone to get some exercise and do some good at the same time! And, in case you are wondering, Gus did eventually get adopted!

Through the Lipsey Veterinary Clinic, we have helped thousands of animals and their owners who

could not get care elsewhere. The Lipsey Clinic has offered high quality, affordable care for years, and recently we have expanded our offerings to include in-community care for those experiencing transportation barriers. The pet owners I meet at our community vaccine clinics love their pets deeply, and the opportunity to provide those beloved animals with quality veterinary care is so important to our mission of keeping pets healthy, safe, and with the people who love them.

While expanding our veterinary reach and services, we have also expanded our pet food pantry! Through partnerships with FeedMore WNY, The Humane Society of the United States, Chewy, and Greater Good Charities, we are positioning ourselves to be the largest pet food pantry resource in Western New York.

With additional support from the East Hill Foundation, our outreach team will be distributing this food to pet owners who find themselves in need of help.

The one thing that remains the same amid all our innovation and expanded programming is that we will always be a safe space for our community's most vulnerable animals. Every day we are a last resort for owners carrying their beloved senior pets through our doors, unable to afford costly euthanasia services elsewhere. We provide compassion and dignity in the owner's most vulnerable time of need, ensuring a painless and comforting passing for pets who have provided love and companionship for years. We cradle infant baby birds, squirrels, and opossums in our hands, providing the exact diet required, giving them a chance at life when nature left them abandoned or motherless. Our investigations team rescues companion, wildlife, and farm animals after they experience the trauma of being hit by a car, abandoned in a home, abused, or neglected. We will never cease our fight for those who need us most, and I know that our reach will grow stronger and wider with you by our side.

EDUCATIONAL FARM

SHELTERS HELPING SHELTERS HELPING SHELTERS

Occasionally animal shelters put out the call to fellow animal shelters for assistance. This was the case in early July, when Ann Marie Gaudio from the Hudson Valley Humane Society (HVHS) was faced with a situation. They had two separate instances involving abandoned goats

being brought to their shelter, primarily a dog and cat shelter, followed quickly by flash floods in their area. An email was sent out to multiple shelters looking for placement for the eight goats they now had. This message was passed along to our educational farm staff to see if we were able to help them. While the HVHS was waiting for shelters to respond, the goats were examined by a veterinarian and received their initial vaccines.

Joanna Dychton, from Lollypop Farm near Rochester, also received this plea for help. Between both of our shelters, we determined we could take the whole herd and find them new homes. Joanna was able to locate an individual who was approximately 2.5 hours away and willing to pick them up and bring them back to their own farm. Joanna could then transport the goats the rest of the way to Lollypop Farm. We, in turn, arranged to drive one of our large vans to Lollypop Farm so we could pick up the pair of goats we had room to take. Coincidentally, Joanna knew someone looking to adopt a peacock, and we had one ready to go up for adoption, so we packed up Percy the peacock and took him along for the ride!

Everything went smoothly that day, and we returned to our farm with a cute pair of female Nigerian Dwarf goats that we named Florence and Doris. As there had been an intact male in the group, our large animal veterinarian performed an ultrasound on both does (female goats) and found that Florence was pregnant and due in about a month! On the evening of October 23, Florence gave birth to an adorable, healthy 4-pound buck kid we named Hudson. In December this trio was adopted!

This tale exemplifies the need for partnerships amongst our vast animal sheltering network to provide connections in times of need. It is always a win-win when organizations can work together for the benefit of the animals in our collective care!

BEHAVIOR DEPARTMENT

WHO LET THE DOGS OUT?

In April 2023, we launched a new program called Doggie Entourage Presented by Moog! The idea was to have our community help with getting our adoptable dogs out of the shelter for a few hours ... or the whole day! And it has been a pawsitively HUGE success!

Every dog in the shelter needs to be walked several times a day and given enrichment several times a day to stay occupied and stimulated. Being out of the kennel and out of the shelter altogether is the BEST enrichment a dog could ask for. And our community has come through! We have had our dogs taken to parks, pet friendly patios, ice cream shops, backyards, and even on a boat ride! SPCA staff and volunteers also get in on the action! We take our adoptable dogs to events around town, too – at markets, cruise nights, fundraisers, and even company offices! We have also partnered with NY State Parks to participate in their Tails on Trails program at Niagara Falls State Park, with more to come.

VETERINARY SERVICES

REVOLUTIONIZING CANINE PARVOVIRUS TREATMENT: A BREAKTHROUGH WITH THE CANINE PARVOVIRUS

In the past year, a groundbreaking treatment, the Canine Parvovirus Monoclonal Antibody Injection, was introduced to combat Canine Parvovirus. As an organization committed to enhancing animal care, we obtained and successfully administered this new treatment to Parvovirus-positive dogs in our community. The use of this innovative therapy has significantly reduced the workload on our veterinary staff, streamlining the care process and leading to faster recoveries for the treated dogs. Before this breakthrough, multiple medications and prolonged intravenous fluid administration were standard, but now, the dogs only need a maximum of three medications twice a day and shorter-term intravenous fluids.

The positive impact extends beyond efficiency, creating a less stressful experience for both the animals and the staff. The new treatment not only speeds up recovery but also minimizes the physical and mental strain on our veterinary team. With the remarkable outcomes observed with the Canine Parvovirus Monoclonal Antibody Injection, we are enthusiastic about incorporating this treatment into our future protocols at the SPCA Serving Erie County, anticipating further positive changes in our care practices and community service.

HUMANE EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

HUMANE EDUCATION TEAM SPREADS KINDNESS AND EMPATHY ACROSS ERIE COUNTY

The Humane Education team actively worked with the community throughout 2023 with hundreds of programs for diverse audiences. We visited schools to instill empathy and responsible animal interaction among students through programs like Encouraging Kind Kids, Paw Protectors, and the Persuasive Writing and Art Contest. We also welcomed scouts for tours and badge workshops.

To expand our reach, we collaborated with community partners like Say Yes Buffalo to bring enriching experiences to families on Saturdays. We brought ambassador animals to create positive encounters, and provided backpacks filled with resources and hands-on activities.

To enhance youth involvement and remove barriers for black, indigenous, and other people of color, the humane education team expanded internal resources and offered weekly volunteer opportunities, internships, and career exploration programs. We also partnered with Buffalo PAL and Buffalo Public Schools to offer internships and exam preparation for the the NYS wildlife rehabilitator examination. Through the Mayor's Summer Youth Employment Program, nine youth gained hands-on experience in various departments.

The humane education team also hosted ten sold-out weeks of our popular Kindness Camps and maintained our twice-weekly Tale for Two (reading to the animals) program. We aspire to continue reaching a broad spectrum of community members through various programs in 2024.

CRUELTY INVESTIGATIONS AND ANIMAL RESCUE DEPARTMENT

PROTECTING ANIMALS: THE INVESTIGATIONS AND RESCUE DEPARTMENT'S IMPACT IN 2023

In 2023, the SPCA Serving Erie County continued to uphold its commitment to the well-being of animals through the work of our Investigations and Rescue Department. The department plays a crucial role in ensuring the protection and welfare of animals in the Erie County community. Through collaborative efforts with law enforcement agencies, the SPCA works tirelessly to investigate cases of animal cruelty, neglect, and abuse.

Here are some of the department's accomplishments in 2023:

- In August, the SPCA rescued 22 dogs from a home unfit for humans and animals. The dogs were found in a small bedroom, some standing on furniture. They were rescued and taken for emergency care. Charges of animal cruelty, totaling 44 counts each, were filed against three individuals.
- Two Amherst men were charged with animal cruelty for beating a small dog. The charges

stem from a video that was posted on Snapchat in June, which showed the men yelling at the dog and beating him with a belt.

 A Cheektowaga man was indicted on felony animal cruelty charges for the deaths of two of his cats. The man is accused of killing the cats by hitting them in the head with a closed fist. He pleaded guilty to one count of Aggravated Cruelty to Animals and in a plea deal reached in March, the man was sentenced to five years of probation and a five-year ban on owning or caring for animals.

OUTREACH DEPARTMENT

PAWS ON THE GROUND

Providing proactive pet health services was something we jumped in feet first in 2023! Pets can only be as healthy as the environment in which they live, so taking a proactive approach to vaccinating pets against some of the most common preventable diseases seemed like a logical step to keeping pets healthy and with their families.

Diseases like Parvo, Leptospirosis and Panleukopenia can be fatal to dogs and cats (respectively) if not treated. These diseases are extremely contagious and can live in the environment for extended periods of time. Treatment options can be very expensive and offer no guarantee of a successful outcome.

Our ACCESS (Animal & Community-Centered Engagement and Support Services) team takes to the streets to bring affordable vaccination services and pet supplies to communities who have limited resource options available for animal care.

In addition to vaccination services, these clinics provide us with an opportunity to connect attendees with local human service organizations such as Evergreen Health, National Fuel, 211 WNY, SNAP and UB Heals, and more. Representatives from these organizations are happy to share their program information with folks who may benefit from the services that are available.

Clinic events are also an excellent opportunity to offer the services of our Pet Food Pantry. Several hundred thousand pet meals and pet supplies are distributed to the community through our Pet Food Pantry each year! Our Community Resource tent is a favorite stop for the pets who visit our clinic, as they often leave with some tasty treats, fun toys, and an occasional jacket or two.

VOLUNTEER DEPARTMENT

SPCA VOLUNTEERS CONNECT WITH COMMUNITY

WILDLIFE DEPARTMENT

A YEAR OF IMPACTFUL PARTNERSHIPS IN WESTERN NY WILDLIFE REHABILITATION

Through close collaboration with fellow wildlife advocates, the Wildlife Department expanded its safety net for WNY animals. Our goal has been to provide a wide-reaching safety net for wildlife in the WNY area through collaborations. In 2023, we actively leveraged our network to achieve greater impact.

The list of collaborators is endless. It's important to remember that each of the wild animals brought to us is connected to a kind-hearted member of the community who took time to find the necessary help that the wild animal needed. This matters! As our ability to provide more and more complicated and specialized care for different injuries for wildlife improves, and as more and more folks in the community grow in empathy toward our wildlife, we need to engage and collaborate with all qualified wildlife rehabilitators. We need to be honest about what we each do well and where we can rely on others to provide things that we can't.

We've worked with Messinger Woods Wildlife Center and transferred many large raptors like Eagles and Peregrines. Why? Because they have the largest aviary in the area. Sometimes they transfer animals to us, too. They may even transfer large raptors to us because we have veterinarians available, and can provide certain diagnostics that their volunteer organization cannot without

consulting the very few vets in the area who will work on wildlife.

We launched the annual Western NY Wildlife Rehabilitators Conference with great success. Fifty attendees collaborated and learned best practices in wildlife medicine. We'll offer it every year due to its positive reception!

We had 125 animals that went into 14 volunteer foster care situations for careful husbandry; usually, this is for orphaned mammals who need round-theclock care.

Speaking of volunteers! Our most valuable community-centered resource is our volunteers! We are so grateful for the 109 wildlife volunteers and the 18 wildlife interns who provided 13,750 volunteer hours in our department. We're dedicated to expanding partnerships to save more wildlife and appreciate the collaborative progress so far!
