#### DOG AND CAT HOARDING

Since the beginning of this year, the SPCA Serving Erie County has been grappling with an increasing number of animal hoarding cases. While each of these truly heartbreaking situations brings unique challenges, the most significant impact has been the considerable strain on our resources. Through these rescues, we've brought 122 at-risk animals into our care, emphasizing how essential our services are and how much we rely on our community's unwavering kindness.

The SPCA has spent \$100,382 on these three cases alone. This staggering figure covers the immediate rescue efforts, extensive veterinary care, specialized grooming, and the ongoing rehabilitation these animals so desperately needed. We can only undertake these vital rescues and provide this level of comprehensive care because of the incredible generosity of our donors. Without your support, these animals would continue to suffer in unimaginable conditions. Here's a closer look at the significant cases we've tackled this year:



#### FEBRUARY: HAMBURG

Our Investigations team worked in bitterly cold temperatures to save 32 puppies and dogs from unsanitary living conditions. They were relinquished to the SPCA, where they received assessments, veterinary care, and much-needed socialization enrichment before being placed for adoption. The owner was charged with animal cruelty.

Total cost: \$18,980

#### **APRIL: WILLIAMSVILLE**

SPCA officers rescued 22 neglected Shih Tzu/Poodle mixes from a Williamsville home. Many of these small



dogs were in shocking condition, covered in urine and feces with severely matted coats, prompting our team to begin grooming and perform health assessments for their substantial needs immediately.

The owner relinquished the dogs, except for one, to the SPCA. He was charged with animal cruelty.

Total cost: \$35,089



#### MAY: HAMBURG

SPCA officers rescued 61 cats and kittens and three dogs from a home. The animals were covered in feces and urine, suffering from severe matting, flea infestations, and malnourishment.

The three owners relinquished the animals to the SPCA, and charges of animal cruelty were filed against the owners.

Total cost: \$46,313

"These hoarding cases are just heartbreaking, and they're incredibly challenging," says Chief Investigations Officer Lindsey Wood. "The scope of these cases is larger than anything I've seen in the past 20 years. But they also really show why what we do here at the SPCA is so important. Honestly, without the incredible generosity of our donors, these animals would just keep suffering in conditions you can barely imagine."

While the financial toll of these large-scale rescues is substantial, we know the true cost of not stepping in, for everyone involved, is far, far greater.
